The Ten 4-H Rules for County Fair

Under-lined italics indicate change in wording from last year.

Rule 1. Membership - 4-H Program is open to youth 5-18 years of age as of December 31, 2016.

* All Livestock, and Horse members must be eight years old by December 31, 2016.

* In order to compete in the 4-H Division of Eagle County Fair, 4-H members must be enrolled in appropriate projects at Eagle County Extension Office by **March 1, 2017**.

Rule 2. Ownership - All 4-H projects must be in possession and care of the 4-H member by Weigh-In-Day for market animals*, **May 1** for dogs, horses** and all breeding animals, **June 27, 2017** for poultry and rabbits. Under no circumstances will a rabbit be tattooed or poultry tagged after June 27th. ***Prior arrangements must be made with the Extension Office before tagging/tattooing date if there is a conflict. Any animal not tagged/tattooed will not be eligible to show at County Fair.***

* Under no circumstances will a livestock animal (beef, sheep, swine and/or goat) be weighed/tagged following the official weigh-in/tagging date. ***Prior arrangements must be made with the Extension Office before the official weigh-in/tagging date if there is a conflict. All livestock animals must be officially weighed/tagged (beef on February 11, 2017 and swine, sheep, goats on May 6, 2017)*** to be eligible to show at County Fair.

**Leasing is possible for horses according to the rules set forth in the Colorado 4-H Horse Rulebook.

Rule 3. One animal per species may be designated as “family”, which any one of enrolled family members may end up showing. Final decision must be made by Fair Weigh-in on Wednesday. The purpose of this rule is to ensure each family member has one animal to sell in that species. It is not intended to ensure three animals per exhibitor to be exhibited at County Fair. Example: A family of three raises four hogs. One is designated family. If a family of three raises six hogs, then there is none to designate as family. Two is the limit for each exhibitor to bring to County Fair.

Rule 4. Pre-Entry - All County Fair 4-H entries are due by **Monday, June 26, 2017**. Entry forms for In-Building projects, dog, horse, rabbits, poultry, breeding beef, breeding swine, breeding sheep, breeding goats will be available online the beginning of May. **Market animal entries for beef, sheep, swine and goats are completed at weigh-in. Therefore market project fair entries for these species are already taken care of.**

Rule 5. Showing - 4-Hers are required to participate in their respective showmanship classes with their own animal. All animals housed in the Eagle River Center during the County Fair must be shown in a market, breeding and/or showmanship class.

Rule 6. Check-In Time - All 4-H exhibits (complete with project and record book) will be checked in on **Monday, July 17, 2017** (by interviews in the Eagle River Center). All animals must be in place by 4:00 p.m. **Wednesday, July 19, 2017** or at the time of their individual respective show, whichever comes first. Market animals will be weighed in between 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. (July 19). Once an animal is weighed-in, it must stay on the Fairgrounds.

Rule 7. All livestock exhibitors are expected to maintain the barns and pens in a fashion pleasing for general public viewing; to include a sign displaying exhibitor name, club, etc. All feed, hay, shavings, and equipment must be furnished by exhibitors. *All equipment and feed must be stored outside the Eagle River Center in one of the designated green horse stalls. Show boxes hung on the inside of livestock pens will not be allowed. Chairs, coolers, personal items, etc. are not to be stored inside livestock pens. At the discretion of show superintendent, each beef participant is allowed to keep one show-box and one blocking/grooming chute inside in ERC within the designated area.*

Rule 8. Age division breakdown for 4-H Classes will utilize the December 31st date. Junior 8-10 years, Intermediates 11-13 years, Seniors 14-18 years.

Rule 9. All animals brought to the Fairgrounds must be disease free. Animals to be checked periodically by Veterinarian - unhealthy stock will be sent home.

Rule 10. Completed Horse and Livestock Record Books must be turned into the 4-H Office by **Monday, August 14, 2017.**

I. Showmanship & Round Robin

Livestock Showmanship is one of the cornerstones of the 4-H Program. 4-Hers are judged on training, grooming and show-ring performance. Fitting implies fitting and management, the use of proper means and methods of developing livestock and making them look attractive to the ringside, prospective buyers and the official judge.

1. Exhibitors must show their own animals of each species in the Showmanship Class. Judge will determine winners by:
 - Showing of animals
 - Appearance of animal
 - Appearance, courtesy and knowledge of exhibitor
2. Breeding livestock are eligible for the showmanship class in each species.
4. The first and second place showman in each age division (horse, beef, goat, sheep, swine) will participate in the Large Animal Round Robin Showmanship contest: Friday, July 21, 2017 at 2:00 p.m. ***Round Robin judges will consist of 4-H alumni.***
5. ***The first and second place showman in each age division (dog, rabbit and poultry) will participate in the Small Animal Round Robin Showmanship contest: Friday, July 21, 2017 at 4:00 p.m. Round Robin judges will consist of 4-H alumni.***
6. Contestants will show the same animal with which they won their respective Showmanship division. Grand Champions will show grand champion animal. Reserve Champion will show reserve champion animal. At the discretion of the species superintendent, where safety or other circumstances are a concern, an animal may be switched for Round Robin.

7. Chin chain on show halter on a given horse must be consistent throughout the show.
8. Contestants will have 3 minutes to show the animal and must show all species of livestock within their respective Round Robin.
9. The highest accumulative score determines the winner. Up to 25 points will be awarded at each station, plus up to 25 points at the first station on how well your animal is fitted and groomed. Ties will be broken by contestant having highest score on own animal. If still tied, Judge will ask a series of questions to break the tie.
10. The contest will start at **2:00 p.m. (Large Animal) and 4:00 p.m. (Small Animal) Friday, July 21, 2017.**
11. Awards - to each age division champion and reserve champion
12. Junior Livestock Projects & Shows state recommendations endorsed by the Colorado State 4-H Youth Development office.

State Recommendation:

Only an animal's owner (a 4-H member) should prepare his/her project animal when it is being exhibited at a county fair or 4-H show. If assistance is needed for safety or educational reasons by a junior member, it may be provided by another Eagle County 4-H member, a parent, or an Eagle County 4-H volunteer leader. Another Eagle County 4-H member should be the first choice for assistance to a junior member. If assistance is provided, the 4-H member enrolled in the project must be present to benefit from the teaching and instruction.

Senior 4-H members should do all of the cleaning, grooming, fitting and showing of their livestock animal from enrollment through sale of the animal, and it is essential they do all of their own cleaning, grooming, fitting and showing of their animals at any show.

Rationale:

Younger 4-H members may need assistance under difficult circumstances. However, the principle here is the importance of the 4-H member being responsible and capable of working on and completing the project. Project selection appropriate for the developmental level of the youth is important. 4-H is youth development. Projects are the vehicle to give youth the opportunity for healthy development. By the time 4-H youth participants are eligible for senior 4-H youth development projects, they should be capable of full responsibility for their animals.

II. Junior Livestock Sale

1. Only Market Animals awarded a **Blue or Red ribbon** by the Judge will be sold in the Sale. **White ribbons will be given to animals that are not market ready. Any animal receiving a white ribbon will NOT be sold in the Junior Livestock Auction.**
2. All 4-Hers intending to sell must help set up for the sale Saturday morning, July 22, 2017 at 8:00 a.m.
3. ***4-Hers can sell two animals***, each of different species. However, up to four (4) market beef can be weighed/tagged on **February 4, 2017** and up to four (4) market lambs, swine, and/or goats can be weighed/tagged on **May 4, 2017**. Only two (2) market animals, per species, can weigh-in at County Fair, **Wednesday, July 19, 2017**. Therefore, only two (2) animals per species can be shown and only one (1) animal per species can sell. Two rabbits & poultry can be brought to fair, sell only one.

4. Minimum weights at County Fair Weigh-In. *There are no maximum weights on any species.*
 - Beef: 1000 lbs. minimum
 - Hogs: 220 lbs. minimum
 - Lambs: 100 lbs. minimum
 - Goats: 60 lbs. minimum
 - Rabbits and Poultry - determined by breed specifications

5. The following Rate of Gain is a guide for Beef, Sheep, Swine, and Goats.
 - Market Beef should gain at least 1.5 pounds per day.
 - Market Hogs should gain at least 1.25 pounds per day.
 - Market Lambs should gain at least .15 pounds per day.
 - Market Goats should gain at least .10 pounds per day.

6. Premise tags are required for all market and breeding sheep and goats in order to show at the County Fair and sell at the Junior Livestock Auction. *Sheep and goats will be checked at spring weigh-in and again at County Fair weigh-in to ensure the presence of a Premise tag.*

7. Sale order of animals will be at the discretion of the JLSC with Grand and Reserve Champions selling first and second. The exhibitor's highest ranking animal will automatically be sold unless species superintendent is notified by the exhibitor that the exhibitor wishes to sell an animal with a lower placing by noon on Friday. There will be no changes once the sale order is printed.

8. Exhibitors must have their animals ready to enter sale ring or lose their slot.

9. Grand and Reserve Grand Champion animals must sell at the Junior Livestock Auction. In the event that an individual exhibitor wins both the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion in one species of the six categories, that individual may only sell one of the animals and must sell the highest ranking animal (Grand Champion); the third place animals will not be moved into reserve champion nor will animals be moved up to fill any champion slot. *In the event that an individual exhibitor wins Grand and/or Reserve Grand Champion with more than two species; that exhibitor must choose which two animals will be sold in the Jr. Livestock Auction. Only two animals per exhibitor are allowed to sell.*

10. The Junior Livestock Auction is a "terminal sale" for all animals including: beef, sheep, swine, goats, poultry, and rabbits. These species of animals that are sold through the Junior Livestock Auction will be processed. There is no option for the buyer to return one of these animal species to the seller (4-H member).

11. *Every poultry animal is considered a separate project. Therefore, poultry animals will be shown in the same market class with their individual species. Class Champions from each species will compete for an overall Grand Champion Market Poultry and Reserve Grand Champion Market Poultry.*

12. A sales commission on the gross sale of each animal may be deducted to help cover sale expenses.

13. To sell, Exhibitor must compete in all regular market and showmanship classes, **INCLUDING ROUND ROBIN, IF SELECTED.** *If an exhibitor chooses not to participate in the Round Robin (when selected); their project will not be considered completed. A 4-H exhibitor is eligible to show in both the Small and Large Animal Round Robin if they qualify for both.*

14. Animals condemned at processing plants due to residues will have sale monies returned to buyer and carcass disposed of.

15. 4-Hers must complete each livestock project in which they are enrolled in order to take those same projects the next year, including a completed record book turned into the 4-H office by **August 14, 2017**. 4-Hers receiving a white award on their 4-H Livestock Records must meet with the JLSC to determine if they are eligible to raise that species of market animal the next year.

16. Scales will be open all day Tuesday (July 18). Official weigh-in starts at 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 19, 2017. One trip per animal across the scales. Wash area will be closed during weigh in. Wet and/or excessively dirty animals will not be weighed. The scale print out will be considered the official weight.

17. No livestock other than those animals from the Junior Livestock Auction can be loaded on the truck and shipped without a written shipping invoice obtained from the JLSC. All extra animals will be shipped with sale animals Sunday morning. See livestock superintendents for shipping form on extra animals.

18. No animal can be removed from the fairgrounds before Sunday, July 23, 2017 without both the 4-H member and species superintendent first signing a release form.

19. Market animals sold at the Eagle County Fair are not eligible for the Colorado State Fair or the National Western Stock Show. Once an animal is shown **and** sold at a 4-H Livestock Auction, it cannot be shown as a market animal again. It may be possible to show females in breeding classes. If you do not wish to sell your animal at the sale, you must notify the species superintendent by Friday noon.

20. 4-Hers have the right to withdraw their animal(s) from the auction, however once an animal enters the ring it is sold to the highest bidder.

21. In order to receive your sale check: you must turn in a completed record book, have the buyer sign the picture/thank-you delivery confirmation and return to the Extension Office.

III. Disqualification from the Show Ring

1. The Judges and Superintendents may disqualify at their discretion any exhibitor using unethical livestock practices; including, but not limited to:

- * Doping animals
- * Starvation diets
- * Drenching lambs
- * Using coloring compounds
- * Use of ice packs or ice towels on lambs
- * Excessive lifting of lamb's feet off the ground or setting on toes
- * Blistering agents
- * Switching of animals
- * Interference with the judge
- * Out-of-control animals
- * Force feeding animals at any time

Unethically Fitted Livestock:

Eagle County Fair has adopted the following rule from the Colorado State Fair:

Doctoring, doping or injecting show animals for body “fill-ins” or the alteration, changing, defacing or any modification of the marking of show animals and the anatomical structure of an animal, the removal, alteration, changing or purposely damaging ear tags; any type of injection where oils, glycerin or like substances are used for body “fill-ins”, external application of such things as liniments and blistering agents that would cause an edematous condition; use of ice packs or other refrigerants to alter the quality of the finish of an animal. No animal shall be decorated with any unnecessary trappings, etc. during judging. No altering of color or structure of hair or wool coat in any way except for trimming or blocking will be allowed. Any grooming material on an entry, when rubbed with a cloth or glove that shows evidence of artificial color shall be an automatic disqualification. This does not apply to hoof dressing on hooves. Any entry adding an artificial tail head or tail fin, artificial poll, or adding any hair or hair-like substance will be disqualified. The showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock is prohibited. Any exhibitor found guilty of any of the above listed unethical practices, or any other practice deemed unethical by the Fair management will forfeit all awards and the owner of the animal will be barred from future participation until such time as reinstatement is made by the management.

International association of Fairs and Expositions National Code of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition.

This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the “IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics”, fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock show. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates

from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3. Exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their own animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates in the animals entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except the external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual

knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Exposition, including *Fairs and Expositions* and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

IV. General Information

1. The modified Danish system of judging will be used in 4-H. All exhibits meeting class requirements will receive a blue, red or white ribbon.

* Class champion and grand champion awards will be based on merit at the judges' discretion. Classes with less than three entries may be combined.

2. No carpets allowed in goat or sheep pens, only shavings can be used.

3. Order of classes - Showmanship - Market - Breeding

4. Awards : (✓✓✓) - Eligible for County Fair Grand Champion Award – belt buckle, jacket or check - **provided at least three entries are shown** in regular classes. No minimum for showmanship classes.

5. To successfully complete a 4-H project, a member must complete project requirements, give a demonstration, exhibit the project at County Fair or a community event, ***show in Round Robin when selected***, and turn in a totally completed Project Record by **August 14, 2017**.

6. It is expected that 4-H livestock participants properly care for their animals during County Fair to include: provide regular access to feed and water, maintain livestock pen(s) in a clean and presentable manner, and abide by general sound husbandry practices. **All animals shall be fed, watered, and pens cleaned by 10:00 a.m. daily. A \$5.00 fee per pen will be assessed for each violation per day. For exceptions, contact the species' superintendent.** Negligence will result in disqualification from the Jr. Livestock Auction.

This policy will be enforced by livestock species superintendents, backed by the Jr. Livestock Commission. If 4-H member fails to abide by these guidelines, they must come to the next regularly scheduled Jr. Livestock meeting to explain their actions before re-enrolling in the 4-H livestock project the following year.

7. No animals will be allowed in the wash rack area except the species of animal that is next to show. For example, no steers will be allowed in the wash rack before and during the swine show.

8. All 4-H project animals must be able to be handled by the exhibitor, superintendent, and judge. The Superintendent will notify the exhibitor and the Junior Livestock Sales Committee (JLSC) that it has been brought to his/her attention that the animal is a threat to the well-being of the exhibitor, spectators or any other fair persons or believed to be dangerous by a species' superintendent(s). This will serve as an official warning to the exhibitor. If the exhibitor then does not maintain control of his/her animal; the Superintendent and JLSC will meet and vote as to whether the exhibitor will be notified to remove his/her animal from the premise and forfeit the opportunity to show (in both market and showmanship) and sell in the Auction. Any and all decisions made by the Superintendent and JLSC are final. If any exhibitor or their family participates in behavior that is unbecoming; disqualification from the entire Fair will result. The JLSC will make the final decision and any exhibitor and/or his/her family not respecting this decision will be disqualified and asked to leave the Fairgrounds.

9. Any calming agents administered to livestock (other than a calming paste) must be pre-approved (by written approval) by species' superintendent. Violation may result in disqualification by the JLSC.

10. The 4-H Staff and Junior Livestock Sales Commission will handle all exceptions to rules. A grievance procedure is available via Junior Livestock Sales Commission. In order to assure fairness, complaints and grievances which cannot be solved by the involved parties must be addressed by: (1) contacting the appropriate species/division superintendent; (2) contacting a member of the Junior Livestock Sales Commission; (3) filing a written grievance with a \$5 non-refundable filing fee with the CSU Extension Office.

Verbal and unsigned complaints will not be considered. The Grievance Committee will consist of two Junior Livestock Sale Commission members, one Fair Board Member, one Extension Agent and the County Extension Director. Any person filing a written grievance has the option of making a personal presentation at a grievance hearing. Decisions of committee are final.

4-H Livestock Classes

Each exhibitor may tag up to four (4) beef. However, only two (2) beef may be shown at fair, but only one (1) may be sold at Livestock Sale.

Exhibitor of beef projects may exhibit heifers in either of the proper breeding or market classes, but not in both.

In addition to the regular halter, neck ropes may be required at the discretion of species superintendent.

Only steers weighed in and tagged on **February 11, 2017** will be eligible for this project. The natural color of a steer cannot be altered using any artificial coloring. However, products that match the steer's natural color may be used in the fitting process from the knees and hocks down and on the switch only. For example, black products may be used on a black-legged steer, red on a red-legged steer and white on a white-legged steer. Under no circumstances can color be used to cover a steer's natural leg color. All Market Beef Classes will be divided by weight.

1. All Market and Breeding Rabbits must be tattooed on **Tuesday, June 27, 2017** in order to be eligible to show at County Fair.
2. No rabbits will be allowed on the Fairgrounds during County Fair that do not have a proper tattoo.
3. Exhibitor of rabbit projects may exhibit rabbits in either of the proper breeding or market classes, but not in both.
4. All animals housed in the Eagle River Center during the County Fair must be shown in market, breeding and/or showmanship class.
5. No rabbits under the age of 6 weeks will be housed at the Eagle County Fair.
6. Show check-in and rabbit weigh-in will be from 7:00 – 7:30 a.m. day of show (Wednesday, July 19, 2017). All market rabbits must weigh in during appointed time to be eligible to show.
7. During County Fair, rabbits can only be removed from their cage by the rabbit owner, owner's parent, species' superintendent, or when the owner/parent/superintendent is present.
8. All rabbit judging will follow American Rabbit Breeders Association (ARBA) rules and standards.

Herdsmanship Award

The purpose of the Herdsmanship Award is to encourage neatness, courtesy, herdsmanhip, cleanliness and citizenship amongst livestock exhibitors and exhibits.

Livestock exhibitors are expected to keep their quarters orderly, neat and attractive the entire length of fair. A committee will periodically inspect and observe both exhibits and exhibitors for the following:

1. Animal, stall and alley cleanliness
2. Animal care, water, feed and bedding
3. Promptness, dedication to purpose
4. Courtesy to judges and general public requesting information
5. Personal appearance
6. Stall identification
7. Sportsmanship
8. Respect and care of fair facilities

Individual herdsmanhip awards will be given for each species. Winners will be announced at the 4-H Awards Banquet. Herdsmanhip will be scored at various times throughout the Fair.

Division 106– Dog Obedience

General Rules:

1. Members must be enrolled in the Dog Project and have their Dog I.D. forms completed by **May 1, 2017**.
2. All dog exhibitors must have county fair entry forms in by **June 26, 2017** to the 4-H Office.
3. Intact animals shall only show if they are not in heat.
4. Any dog showing aggression shall be excused from the ring.
5. Any participant displaying rough or abusive behavior to their dog shall be excused from the ring.

General Rules:

1. The Eagle County 4-H Horse Show is open to 4-Hers 8-18 years of age on **December 31, 2016** who are properly enrolled in the horse project by **March 1, 2017** at the Eagle County CSU Extension office.
2. A 4-Her must register horses for their project through 4-H Online by **May 1, 2017**. There will be no additions or changes after this date for any reason. A member can register and show a total of FOUR (4) horses for showing in Western, Breeding Class, English, Ranch Horse, and Drill Team.
3. Member must have horses, whether owned or leased, in their possession and/or providing care and management by **May 1, 2017**.
4. County Fair 4-H Horse Show entry forms are due to the 4-H Office by **Monday, June 26, 2017**.
5. The official rule book for the show will be the Colorado 4-H Horse Rule Book – 2015 edition.
6. For Western, English, Gymkhana, and Ranch Horse classes, rosettes and/or awards will be presented to first through sixth place in each class. Classes with less than three entries may be combined or eliminated.
7. All western and english competitors must show in their respective Showmanship class: Friday, July 7, 2017 beginning at 5:00 p.m. for english competitors and/or Saturday, July 8, 2017 beginning at 9:00 a.m. for western competitors. ***Drill Team participants must show in either the Western or English Showmanship class in order to complete the horse project.*** Showmanship is optional for Ranch Horse participants.
8. Round Robin Showmanship - 1st and 2nd place winners in **western** showmanship classes must enter the Large Animal Round Robin competition **Friday afternoon, July 21, 2017 beginning at 2:00 p.m.** ***If an exhibitor that is selected for the Round Robin chooses not to participate; that member will not complete the horse project and will not be eligible to enroll in the horse project in 2018.***

Any exhibitor who wishes to compete for a Round Robin position in the Horse Division must show in the Western Showmanship class on **Saturday, July 8, 2017 at 9:00 a.m.** The first and second place Showmanship winners in each age division in the WESTERN Showmanship class only will be eligible to participate in the Large Animal Round Robin competition **Friday afternoon, July 21, 2017 beginning at 2:00 p.m.**

SHOW DAY IS FOR 4-H RIDERS. Adults may assist with any situation where safety is a concern.
No schooling by anyone other than the 4-H member.

9. All 4-H Horse Exhibitors are required to take a written exam which is considered a regular class and will be counted towards high point awards. Written Exam will be given the same day as the County Fair Horse Show(s). Exhibitors will be asked to forfeit their test and leave the area if they share answers with others. Every effort will be made to provide written tests with only one possible correct answer per question. The protest of any question must be made by the exhibitor. Once the last exhibitor has completed their exam, the key to the exam will be made available to all contestants. From the time the key is posted, exhibitors will have 1 hour to

protest the answer(s) to any question(s). Once the hour has expired, the test results are final and no changes will be made.

Exhibitors are required to take the written exam only once no matter the number of disciplines entered. Written exam is given during both the English/Western Horse Shows (Friday and Saturday) and the Ranch Horse Show (Sunday).

The score will be used to calculate high point awards for each discipline.

10. Completed 4-H Horse Record Books are due at the 4-H office by **August 14, 2017.**

11. Exhibitors are responsible for their stalls and care of their horses.

12. Champion and Reserve Champion 4-H Horse Exhibitors (Junior, Intermediate, Senior) will be selected at the Fair for each age division in Ranch Horse, Western, and English provided there are three riders in each age division.

All Classes in each Division will be awarded through sixth and scored through tenth. Placings will be given a point value that will be used to determine individual totals for County Fair Champions and will be based on the number of entries. For example, if a class has a total of 10 or more entries, points will be awarded as follows: 1st – 10 points, 2nd – 9 points, 3rd – 8 points, etc. 10th – 1 point. If a class has less than ten entries, points will be awarded based on the number of entries. For example, if a class has a total of 7 entries, points will be awarded as follows: 1st – 7 points, 2nd – 6 points, 3rd – 5 points, etc.

Points from all classes entered will count towards High Point Overall with the exception of the Walk Trot Classes in both English and Western Divisions.

FOR ALL CHAMPIONSHIP AWARDS, POINTS ARE KEPT FOR SAME HORSE, SAME RIDER.

4-H Freedom Riders Drill Team Superintendents: Kendra Scott and Shelly McCoy

1. The Freedom Riders 4-H Drill Team is open to 4-Hers 8-18 years of age on December 31, 2016 who are properly enrolled in the horse project by **March 1, 2017**.
2. All horses to be used in the Drill Team must be registered at the 4-H Office. A 4-Her may register horses through 4-H online by May 1, 2017. Members can register and use four horses total at performances provided all are registered.
3. Members must have horses, whether owned or leased, in their possession and/or providing care and management by May 1.
4. Completed 4-H Horse Record Books due at the 4-H Office by **August 14, 2017**.
5. It is strongly recommended for all Drill Team participants to be rated as a Level I advancement rider prior to performing at the County Fair and Rodeo.
6. All tack and equipment provided by the Drill Team for the member's use shall remain the property of the Drill Team. It is the responsibility of the individual member to keep tack clean. Tack and equipment provided by the Drill Team should only be used when performing.
7. It will be expected of all participants to behave in a respectable and courteous manner at all times to both leaders and other riders.

8. Safety is of utmost concern by the Drill Team leaders. Unsafe riding practices will not be tolerated.
9. In the event that the Drill Team performs during the PRCA rodeo, all riders will abide by all rules of the PRCA that pertain to the Drill Team Performing Act during the Eagle County Fair and Rodeo.
10. Taking a written test during the County Fair is required for all Drill Team participants.

11. Competing in the 4-H Showmanship Class (either on Friday, July 7 or Saturday, July 8, 2017) is required for all Drill Team participants to complete their project and participate in the Drill Team for 2018.

12. To successfully complete the 4-H Drill Team Horse Project, a member must actively partake in the Freedom Rider's 4-H Club including, but not limited to:

- a. Attend at least 60% of regular business meetings and riding practices (with the exception of excused absences)
- b. Take part in community service projects and fund raising activities
- c. Give a demonstration at a club meeting
- d. Compete in the County Fair Showmanship Class (either English or Western)
- e. Turn in a completed 4-H Horse Record Book by **August 14, 2017**.

4-H IN-BUILDING EXHIBITS

Projects that have previously been shown as a 4-H Project may not be entered again. Member's records may be either in pencil, ink or by computer. Your choice will not affect judging. Content and neatness is the key consideration in judging.

4-Hers must complete each In-Building project in which they are enrolled in order to take those same projects the next year, including a totally completed record book turned with your project: **Tuesday, July 11, 2017 for clothing projects and Monday, July 17, 2017 for all other in-building projects.**

Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class. The first place exhibit in each class is eligible for State Fair. Judges may combine classes and/or divisions in the selecting of Grand Champion Awards.
